## **CREATING A BUTTERFLY GARDEN in New Mexico**

**Step 1:** Pick a 3 to 5 foot area, mostly sunny, (more than a half day of sunshine) that is at least partially protected, year round, from most of the elements of weather.

**Step 2:** After April 20<sup>th</sup> (the last day of know frost on record in New Mexico), turn the soil of the area. Amend the soil of the new garden area, with compost. If your soil has a lot of clay, also add some sand to it.

**Step 3:** Plant flowers, herbs and shrubs that attract the butterflies in NM. These would include but, are not limited to: astilbe (shade), companula (sun), Butterfly bush (sun/shade), Daylilies (sun), Caryopteris (sun) Hollyhocks (sun/shade), Echinacea (sun), Monarda (sun), Mallow (sun), phlox (sun), milkweed (sun), Queen Anne's lace (sun), violets (sun/shade), Liatris (sun), Rudbeckia (sun), parsley (sun), dill (sun), fennel (sun), Asters (sun), Coreopsis (sun), Zinnias (sun), Lantana (sun), Golden Rod (sun), Sedum (shade/sun), Cat Mint(sun/shade), Vitex (sun), Salvia (sun), Verbena (sun/shade).

**Step 4:** Water 2-3 times per week during the growing season. Consider mulching around your plants with an organic material.
